- I. Forgiveness is so hard!
 - A. Whether a small unkind action or word on something serious like child abuse, harm done by others sinks in deeply and we suffer
 - B. Part of the reason harm hurts so much is that it introduces hell into our lives, often hellish spirits we are not equipped to deal with.
 - C. When our armour up, can deal with the hell, but when we are blindsided or vulnerable it's hard
 - D. This is why we are so offended by child abuse
 - 1. That child is not only hurt, but more significantly, introduced to a hell that they have no capacity at all to cope with
- II. What happens?
 - A. We feel rage, revenge, pain, depression, black moods, acting out in ways we thought we'd never do, etc
 - B. Perhaps most painful is that we all to often do the exact thing that was done to us
 - 1. Survivors of sexual abuse are more likely to be sexually promiscuous
 - 2. Children subjected to domestic violence are more likely to deal with conflict violently
 - 3. Why? Those hells were let in, and their presence causes actions we may not be able to control
- III. And we know we are supposed to forgive, and that it's important that we forgive
 - A. We prayed today, "Forgive us our debts as (or to the extent that) we forgive our debtors"
 - 1. We can receive the Lord's forgiveness to extent that a forgiving spirit is in us
- IV. What is forgiveness? Assuming for now we are forgiving real harm
 - A. Webster's Dictionary says forgiveness is "to cease to feel resentment against an offender"
 - B. New Church teaching says, "That to which no attention is paid is said to be forgiven." (*Heavenly Secrets* # 10504)
 - 1. Put away, send away
 - C. It is easiest to define it by its opposite, which is interesting.
 - 1. *Not* feeling revenge and anger
 - 2. Not paying attention to or dwelling on the issue any more
- V. Let's explore a couple of things forgiveness is not, because false kinds of forgiveness can cause a lot of pain
 - A. Forgiveness is not pretending it never happened or not judging anything
 - 1. We are told in the Word to "judge righteous judgment"
 - 2. If someone cheats you or lies to you, you are supposed to say it happened & that it is wrong
 - 3. There is a big difference between judging (saying it did happen and it was bad), and condemning (saying the person is evil for doing this)
 - B. 2: We may forgive while not forgetting
 - 1. Obviously, you don't send your child over to the house of someone who was abusive

- 2. You don't readily trust a liar or give money to a thief
- 3. What you do is look at their subsequent life. The Lord said: Go and sin no more." The question is has this person changed? If they have, then you might consider forgetting, but until then you need to keep their weakness in mind
- 4. Related to this: Every evil brings its own punishment. There is a universal justice
 - a. One way to think of forgiveness is to say, "You did this terrible thing. If in your heart you actually meant it and it was not a mistake, then you are bringing terrible pain into your life. I feel compassion and sadness that you have so much pain."
- C. 3: There's a big difference between unforgiveness and grief!
 - 1. We may feel sadness for pain others have caused us and for the consequences in our lives
 - a. This is not unforgiveness, but genuine, healthy grief
 - 2. Unforgiveness is hatred and wanting them to suffer
- VI. Here is another definition of forgiveness the Lord gives: "To forgive is not to regard any one from [the point of view of] evil but from [the point of view of] good" (AC 7697)
 - 1. Look for the good, notice the good, look from good
 - 2. And if you see evil try to correct it
 - 3. So don't be blind to harm, but look with eyes of love and charity
- VII. What is the danger in not forgiving?
 - A. The danger is that unforgiveness is tied to revenge; you want the other person to *pay*, and the underlying emotion there is hate
 - B. It is looking at someone else from the point of view of evil
 - 1. Think about how you beat others up in your mind when angry
 - C. The danger, then, is that unforgiving feelings, anger, & resentment cause hellish emotions in us that hurts us more than what anyone else can do to us
 - 1. The saying goes that unforgiveness is "Drinking poison and hoping it will kill the other person"
 - D. We need to acknowledge the pain of betrayal & hurt, but in a healthy way
 - E. Does it seems absurd to think of forgiveness as shunning the evil of hatred or revenge? Is a part of you saying, "Wait a minute, look how **they** hurt **me**"?
 - 1. Misdirection is one of main tactics of the hellish influences in our life
 - F. What if they never say sorry? What if they never see it?
 - 1. Well that will be really sad for them and for you. It would be nice if they owned up and helped you to heal
 - 2. But let's be clear: Their saying sorry is not why you forgive. It helps, no doubt, but forgiveness is something inside
 - G. Here's a perspective leading to forgiveness that is not nice
 - 1. Think now of all the bad things you've done over your life. Every unkind word, every selfish behaviour, every untrue statement
 - a. It's a pretty big list, isn't it?
 - b. Forgiveness comes, in part, when we see that we are more like

that person who hurt us than we are like the Lord

- c. We need be hear Him say, "He who is without sin among you, let him throw a stone at her first."
- VIII. In practical terms, what are some things we can do when trying to forgive?
 - A. The main step is to acknowledge the harm done. Say it is wrong, unfair, horrible, or whatever. Do not feel guilty for having been hurt!
 - 1. Then you take personal responsibility for your response.
 - 2. It is saying, "I refuse to do the double damage of letting hell into my heart because of what you did. I will not drink the poison to spite you."
 - 3. Then turn to the Lord and ask Him help in letting it go
- IX. Forgiveness may be the hardest of all things to do
 - A. It is where we say once and for all, I am responsible for my feelings, and for my spiritual welfare
 - B. It is right to feel anger & a desire to protect. It is also right to seek restitution.
 - C. But it is more important to say: "You may have done terrible things to me, but I will not allow hell to be in me because of that."
- X. The Lord forgives you right away. He never holds anything against you. But in order to receive His forgiveness He needs you to give it out
 - A. Come to me all you who labour and are heavy laden. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, that My yoke is easy and My burden light.
